

RECTOR'S REFLECTION

All around the world in the last couple of days a curious slogan has appeared: "Je suis Charlie". It is a response to the craven massacre of twelve people—including journalists, visitors, custodial or administrative staff, and two police officers—by masked gunmen in Paris on Wednesday. The shooters, who were killed by French police on Friday afternoon, were apparently retaliating for the satirical cartoons that Charlie Hebdo, a French satire magazine, published depicting the prophet Muhammad in demeaning and irreverent postures. The massacre has touched off a worldwide debate on the sanctity of the freedom of expression and of the right of the press to engage in satire. Many have adopted "Je suis Charlie" as a sign of their solidarity with those who were murdered and of their conviction that speech must remain free, even in the face of the threat of death and violence from extremists. On CBC Radio on Friday morning, there was a debate about whether the cartoons in question should be republished by the media as accompaniment to the news stories and there were passionate arguments for and against. I myself cannot adopt the slogan, "Je suis Charlie", because, as much as I condemn the violent murders and lament the perversion of Islam by such radical extremists, I also cannot stand in solidarity with a magazine that engages in the most base form of satire. It is neither funny nor well-drawn and is often racist, demeaning, and incendiary. I am not playing "blame the victim", but at the same time, the popular culture is making these people into martyrs, which I am not convinced they were.

Why is this important to us in church today? I believe it is important because it speaks to a wider societal trend where, with a twenty-four hour news cycle, the media must always have content in order to sate the enormous appetite of TV, print, and internet news consumers. This means that there are often snap judgements and assumptions made, often wrong, because there is so little time for reflection. In our globalised world, we encounter innumerable people who think, speak, interact, and believe differently than we do. It's easy to believe that our comfortable old existence is under threat from external influences like immigrants with a different language, culture, and religion. This is what Charlie Hebdo appears to have believed and they manifested this belief through grotesque depictions of a religion towards which they were clearly intolerant and antagonistic.

Today we mark the Baptism of the Lord. We have only just finished the Christmas season, wherein we celebrated the birth of Jesus, and already we find ourselves thirty years later on the banks of the Jordan witnessing Jesus being baptised by John. In their dialogue, Jesus tells John that he has come to be baptised and John replies that, surely, Jesus must be wrong for it would make more sense for Jesus to baptise John. Jesus insists, claiming that it must be so in order to fulfil Scripture, and John complies. As Jesus rises up from the water, the Holy Spirit is present and the voice from heaven declares, "This is my Son, the Beloved, in whom I am well-pleased."

In this moment, Jesus takes his place among men and women. In the Incarnation, we rejoice that Jesus was born a man. In his baptism, we find that he intends to live as any ordinary one of us would. The connection to the news stories this week is this: as Jesus takes his place among us, we hear spoken to us the same words of God's pleasure in us. Our response, then, demands that we perceive others to also be God's beloved children. When we are confronted with hatred, violence, and death, let us respond as Jesus would: by standing beside our brothers and sisters, and retaliating not with violence and hate but with love and peace.
