

## RECTOR'S REFLECTION

"If it ain't broke, don't fix it." One of those old adages that we all know. And one that we seem to hear quite a bit in church. I'm thinking of throwing it out of my vocabulary, though. Although it is not an unsound principle—why waste money buying a new TV just for the sake of having a new TV when the old one works just fine still—the way I've heard it of late is less to do with fiscal frugality and more to do with, "I don't want to change".

I was at a conference the other day where one of the presenters was telling us that the organisation for whom he worked was losing funding partners and was beginning to be unable to provide its programs. He started to implement a new way of looking at the delivery of resources and a client came into the office one day during the transition. She was upset that the program she was using was going to change. Her argument was, "If it ain't broke, don't fix it." From her perspective, of course, everything was working fine. She had been getting what she wanted. But there were other people who were not receiving the services they needed and the money was drying up in the former funding model. She was unable to see this big picture and only knew that what she was dealing with appeared not to be broken. She just couldn't see that, in fact, the whole thing was broken.

The more I think about it, the more I see that our culture in church has become one of saying, "if it ain't broke, don't fix it". We don't actually reflect on anything, we just like the way things have always been, and so we trot out this wonderful old adage in order to justify our complacency. Those who insist on fixing things get accused of "change for the sake of change". Tensions build.

In the Gospel for this week, we read of Jesus' first foray into public ministry after calling the first disciples. In Capernaum, on the Sabbath, Jesus went into the synagogue. It is noteworthy that, after taking Simon, Andrew, James, and John from their routines, he took them to the synagogue, a place of security, ritual and tradition. While there, he stood up to teach, and we are told that the congregation was astounded at his teaching, for he taught them as one having authority. Suddenly, in the synagogue, there was a man who was possessed by an unholy demon whom Jesus confronted. While the congregation was astounded at Jesus' boldness in teaching, the demon appears to be the only character who truly understood who Jesus was. There is a tension here: the people who so desperately long for the liberation of the Messiah failed to recognise him. Sure, they perceived that he taught with authority, but it was only the demon who said, "I know who you are, the Holy One of God". Into this place of security and tradition, a new authority had come that the people really didn't understand and which threatened to turn everything upside down. As the story continues to unfold, Jesus' fame spreads and he takes his message out of the synagogue and into the villages and towns of the region all around.

As we invite Jesus into our midst in our celebration of the Lord's Supper this week, let us pray that he will come with a new authority that enables us to truly see him for who he is, that allows us to truly commit ourselves to follow him, and that gives us the courage to proclaim his message not only in our congregation but in the towns and villages all around us. Let us see that Jesus comes to fix our broken world and desires change not for its own sake but for ours. Let the scales of security and tradition fall from our eyes, that they may be opened to the potential of our becoming a people who are prepared to follow Jesus in creating opportunities for healing and transformation for ourselves, for our neighbours, for the world.
