

RECTOR'S REFLECTION

In our Lenten study the other night, we were discussing ways to share the good news with people. We talked about how we might better share our stories of Jesus and encourage people to really get to know who Jesus is and how to follow his example. Of course, most of us seem to have a hard time openly sharing our faith. We often don't want to be seen as too pushy or judgemental or perhaps we feel as though we have inadequate words to answer the questions people might ask us. Whatever the source of our reticence, I'd say we have a pretty solid track record of not being very vocal about who and what we believe in.

Not so the crowds on Palm Sunday. As we read in the story from the Gospel of Mark this week, the people were quite exuberant in their proclamation of Jesus. "Many people spread their cloaks on the road, and others spread leafy branches that they had cut in the fields. Then those who went ahead and those who followed were shouting, "Hosanna! Blessed is the one who comes in the name of the Lord! Blessed is the coming kingdom of our ancestor David! Hosanna in the highest heaven!" There was no doubt in the minds of those in the crowd who Jesus was. They were convinced that he was the Messiah, the one who would be like a second King David, who would liberate them from the unfair and oppressive regime of the Roman Empire.

As we know, however, as the week went on, Jesus failed to live up to their expectations and, by what we now call Good Friday, Jesus was on trial before the religious authorities and the imperial governor. While there is some debate over whether it was the same crowd that gathered outside Pilate's palace as the one that followed Jesus on Palm Sunday, the fact remains that it was the crowd that was incited to demand the release of the murderer Barabbas and the crucifixion of Jesus. So sure on Palm Sunday of the fulfilment of their expectations, a few days later, the crowd cried out in their blood lust for the murder of Jesus. It wasn't that he didn't come to strive against injustice and oppression. It's just that he didn't do it in the way the people wanted him to.

As we journey with Jesus through holy week, "from the glory of the palms to the glory of the resurrection by way of the dark road of suffering and death", I invite you to be mindful of how you understand who Jesus is and what his mission was while he was with us on earth. Too often we struggle when our expectations of God are not met: not because God failed to come through but because our expectations were based on what we want God to do rather than on what God says he will do. If we want to be like the crowds who were sure of who Jesus was on that Palm Sunday long ago so that we may boldly proclaim him to those who do not yet know him, then we need to be sure of who he is.

This week, we are worshipping in a different way. We're in the hall instead of the church. We will have a reflection with four voices participating in it rather than a sermon. This is what I want you to take away from this experience of Palm Sunday worship this week: our faith put into practice is not just confined to the four walls of the church. It's not just words and gestures reserved for a holy day and set aside safely on a shelf the rest of the week. It is alive and real and it happens not only in our worship but in our fellowship, in our work, in every interaction with have with others. It is not just worshipping Jesus but sharing with him in the way of the cross, striving against the unjust and oppressive powers of the world. As the collect for Palm Sunday says, "may we follow the example of his great humility and share in the glory of his resurrection". Amen.
