

## RECTOR'S REFLECTION

One of the most evocative passages in Scripture is the first eight verses of the sixth chapter of Isaiah. The prophet's vision is firmly rooted in history—we are told that it occurred in the year that King Uzziah died (around 738 BC)—but it gives us a glimpse at the throne of God. Right from the very beginning of the passage, as the prophet tells us that the king had died, we are to understand that human kings will come and go but that God's sovereignty is eternal.

After a vision of smoke swirling around the room; of God, whose majesty is so vast and incomprehensible that the hem of his garment fills the room; and of the seraphim whose voices shake the very foundations of the building, we come to the point of decision. At the conclusion of this passage, God has purified Isaiah and called him to go forth to the people with a message. God says, "Whom shall I send, and who will go for us?" Isaiah responds, "Here am I; send me."

We read this passage on Trinity Sunday not because it is the call of Isaiah to a ministry of prophecy but because it contains some of the earliest material that the Church fathers had to work with in developing the doctrine of the Trinity. Some would argue that there is no unequivocal basis for this doctrine of one God but three persons in Scripture—the word "Trinity" is never even used in the Bible. Yet, the doctrine of the Trinity has become one of the cornerstones of Christian faith, cemented in the creed that came from the Council of Nicaea in AD 325 (yes, the Nicene Creed we say most Sundays is 1,700 years old!).

Even if there is no direct reference to the Trinity in Scripture, theologians in the early Church saw in this passage from Isaiah a number of pointers to an early understanding of God as three persons. First, there is the song of the seraphim, "Holy, holy, holy", which was taken to refer to each of the three. Then, the curious shift in person in the interrogation, "Whom shall I send, and who will go for us?" The "I" in the first half refers to God as One, the "us" in the second half refers to God as a council of Three. Even though the Nicene Creed was only formalised in the year 325, it had antecedents that were 1,000 years older yet.

So, the question then, for us, is why do we care about this mystery that we call the doctrine of the Trinity? Perhaps, on one level, it is enough to simply let it alone, saying that it's a mystery and we will never understand it. And, besides, you might say, what impact does it have on our daily life? In and of itself, perhaps not much. But, to my mind, so much ink—and, indeed, blood—has been spilt over this doctrine that it *must* be important for some reason.

For me, ultimately, it comes down to this: the awesome majesty of God, whom we know to be One, but exists in three Persons—Father, Son, and Holy Spirit—is an image of a Community that works together at creating, redeeming, and sanctifying the world. As we have just come through the Great Fifty Days of Easter, culminating in the Feast of Pentecost, we have heard the stories of the Creation, the Resurrection, and the descent of the Holy Spirit.

As we enter into the season of Sundays after Pentecost, where we focus less on the events of Jesus' life and more on our response to them, we find that we are called, like Isaiah, to witness to the power of God to create, redeem, and sanctify the world. And, perhaps, as we strive each day to become more like Jesus, whom John Calvin thought to be the face of the invisible God, we might also become a community of creation, redemption, and sanctification. "Whom shall I send, and who will go for us?" Here am I; send me.
