

RECTOR'S REFLECTION

I attended seminary with a woman in her early sixties who was tiny—maybe five feet tall. More noticeable about her than her height, though, was the fact that she had a withered hand. One day, she and I were talking about prayer and she told me that, when she was younger, she had developed extreme arthritis that eventually rendered her hand virtually useless. She told me that she had prayed and prayed to be cured, hoping that God would restore her hand to its full functionality. The prayer was not answered in the particular way she wanted. But, she told me that God did answer the prayer. She said that she was obviously not *cured* but that she felt she had been *healed*. While she struggled with the withered hand, she had learned to live with it, and as a result of her praying, she had learned to live with a greater sense of joy in life, even more than before the arthritis. She said: God does answer prayer, although not always (not often?) in the way we want; and, God doesn't always cure us, but God does seek to give us healing.

The second story is more recent and local. I visit a shut-in community member on a fairly regular basis who has advanced dementia. We share stories, some of which are utterly fantastical, and I pray and listen and just sit there in comfortable silence sometimes. One of the family members told me once that when the dementia started to set in, all of their friends started to drift away. People would come to visit and not know how to deal with someone who was clearly losing touch with reality so they eventually stopped visiting. Now, life is lonely and it wears on the family. Our society—even with all of its medical advances, or perhaps because of them—does not know how to cope with illness and disease and so, because it makes us uncomfortable, we tend to shy away from it. But what does this do to the sick? It makes them feel lonely, abandoned, and of less worth.

These two stories speak to the Gospel this week. Jesus, after having calmed the storm on the Sea of Galilee (about which we heard last week), has arrived back on solid ground and is confronted first by Jairus, whose daughter is sick, and then by the woman who had been bleeding for twelve years. The bleeding woman has had a menstrual difficulty for some time which would exclude her from worship because she was ritually unclean and it would mean that she would have few friends and people willing to associate with her. Her illness left her lonely and likely feeling worthless. Jairus' daughter has an unspecified disease but it is serious enough that she has been brought to the edge of death. In the woman's case, her faith heals her. In the little girl's case, her father's faith heals her.

In both of these stories, Jesus demonstrates—as he did last week by commanding the wind and waves—his authority over all things. We are meant to know that Jesus wields God's power to heal, and in both of these cases, he does. There are two lessons for us in this week's Gospel. First, God has the power to heal and clearly desires, as we saw in Jesus' actions, to do so in order to restore the sick to wholeness and health—and that this was a response to the faithfulness of the main characters. The second lesson is this: the healing of both the woman and the girl restored them to their rightful place in society. Being healed is as much about being in right relationship with God and with our neighbours as much as it is about bodily health. Jesus' immediate awareness that power had flowed out of him shows us that our connectedness to one another is vitally important to our spiritual and physical health. As we strive to minister to each other in the name of Christ, I pray that the healing power of God's love may flow out from us into those around us, and that together we restore each other to wholeness and health.
