

RECTOR'S REFLECTION

There might have been one or two times when I was a kid that I was threatened with having my head served on a platter if I didn't do some chore or another. I thought it a strange saying until I figured out what it meant and discovered that the saying was not original to my mother but was, in fact, to be found in Scripture!

The story is not so much about Jesus this week as it is about his slightly older cousin John the Baptist. We know John well. In Luke's Gospel, the first two chapters alternate between the announcements of the births of John and Jesus. In all of the Gospels, John goes around as a herald of Jesus' birth and is the weird guy who roamed the desert calling people to repentance while clothed in camel's hair and eating locusts and honey. The story begins with a subtle reference to the crowds who were beginning to clamour about Jesus' powers. They were not quite sure who he was or from where he got his power. So, like people are wont to do, they speculated. Some thought he was John the Baptist, others thought Elijah. Herod himself thought that Jesus was likely John the Baptist, whom he had beheaded, raised back to life.

Cue the flashback: we are in Herod's court before Jesus came on the scene. John the Baptist is going around preaching and proclaiming. John had gotten on the wrong side of Herod's wife, who was the widow of his brother. There are complicated legalisms involved here in Jewish culture, but suffice it to say that John disapproved of Herod having married Herodias. Herodias was not impressed and she held a grudge. Herod was caught in the middle, however, between keeping his wife happy and trying to live a righteous life after the example that he saw in John the Baptist. For the most part, he was able to keep his wife at bay and, although history remembers him as a weak king (he was the son of Herod the Great, who was king when Jesus was born), he did try to do the right thing. He listened to and respected John the Baptist and, as we are told, he protected him.

At the feast in the story, however, he makes a foolish promise to Salome, his daughter, that he will give her anything, up to half of the kingdom. Salome runs to her mother, who tells her to ask for John's head. Herod, now in an intractable situation, must deliver, even though it is clear that he would rather not. Thus, John the Baptist was killed—because a weak man was unable to do what he knew was right in the face of human sinfulness. As in birth, John's death gives us a foretaste of Jesus' death: at the hands of a weak king who does what is expedient rather than what is right.

Carrying on the theme from last week, where we looked at our predilection towards satisfying our own preferences rather than acting out of faith and submission to God's will, the Gospel this week challenges us yet again. There are prophets like John the Baptist among us and we may even listen to and want to heed them. But there are also Herodiases among us who pressure us into acting against our best interests and God's hopes for the world. Almost daily, do we not find ourselves in the position of Herod, who must choose between doing what is right and giving in to various worldly pressures? Mark intends for us to hear this passage as a call to make our life decisions based on the principles of our faith, on what is right. He warns us that when we, like Herod, make decisions in bad faith, because it's easier or makes us look better, then we too risk being "deeply grieved." So let us pray for the faith and courage to do what is right and faithful, whatever the cost. Let us be like John the Baptist, even if it means having our heads on a platter.
