RECTOR'S REFLECTION

I am sure that, by now, you will seen the image of three-year-old Alan Kurdi lying face down on a Turkish beach. The boy drowned while fleeing to Europe with his family as they sought to escape the devastation of the civil war in Syria. The news is full of stories of Europeans who are welcoming refugees at train stations and border crossings and it has had an impact even here on our general election as the Conservative leader was accused of a heartless response to the mounting refugee crisis, particularly when it was revealed that there was a plan to bring Kurdi's family to Canada that was derailed by a byzantine immigration policy.

For us, this politically-charged issue resonates. It should not matter whether we consider ourselves liberal or conservative—there is a deeper Christian response demanded of us that should cut across political lines. If it was not enough to remember that even the Holy Family were refugees—fleeing to Egypt to escape the wrath of King Herod—the gospel this week strikes right at the heart of the crisis.

In Jesus' time, children were nobodies. They had no power or political clout. In setting the little child among the disciples and saying that whoever would welcome such a little one welcomed Jesus himself, Jesus was doing something scandalous and radical. The kingdom of God is not about power and privilege. It is, instead, about lifting up the lowly and the powerless. God overturns social hierarchies and looks out for the needy. Those who follow Jesus are called to resist the imperial powers of our time, the powers that say, "Look after Canadians first" or "Send them all back home." The kingdom of God reminds us that we are all brothers and sisters, children of the same God, whose love is extended freely to all.
